The Manse

Dear friends,

This letter is written just after spending some time gathering fallen autumn leaves from the front steps of the manse. We have had a glorious summer, but autumn is most certainly here now. The cycles of life and seasons of the year roll around before we know it. The turn of colour and the rustle of fallen leaves are an annual display of a deciduous tree's natural cycle at the end of its growth season, and in church we celebrated that with the Tree of Thanks everyone decorated at the Harvest service.



That cycle between times of budding and new growth through times of fruitfulness and abundance to times when what was good has finished its role and needs to be cleared away is true of a deciduous tree as it is for other aspects of life, and even church life.

There are times when we need to think about our own lives for it is very easy to keep adding and adding responsibilities and tasks, like a tree being burdened with an ever heavier load, when for our own sakes there are things of which we should consider letting go in order to allow room for something new to bud. Jesus spoke about something similar when he talked about the burden of a yoke placed around our necks. He was referring to the burden of the Jewish law on people, and that he lifted that burden from us, but the point is the same. What burdens are no longer life-giving to us, what can we discard, shaking the leaves from the branches of our lives to give the Spirit of God space to work in our lives. When the leaves fall from the trees we find the light able to shine into places that had previously been shaded. Perhaps that could be the same for our lives also.

Church Roof Repairs

On the 2nd October, an inspection of the Church Roof was carried out by representatives of the Property Group, Sholto Humphries of GPA Humphries (Architects) and Graeme Cheyne of Graeme .W.Cheyne (Builders) Ltd. The condition of several areas of the roof gave cause for concern and will require repairs on an urgent basis .

The Architect has prepared a detailed report on the roof condition and the content of this was discussed at the Congregational Board on the 9th October. The Board was in agreement that the repairs to the lead valleys, slating, chimney heads and cement verge haunchings should be carried out as soon as possible.

The estimated costs for these repairs is £10,000. The Board also agreed that, as a result of the roof repairs, items of routine planned building maintenance would be deferred to a future date.

Guild Lunch

Following their dedication service on 17th November, members of The Guild are holding a soup and bread lunch in aid of two Guild projects. Tickets are available from Guild members. Your support will be very much appreciated.

“Heart for Art’ is an innovative new project based in the South Side of Glasgow and provides Creative Art opportunities for people with dementia and their carers. The project provides a forum for people with dementia to express themselves through the medium of art, whilst providing support and information to carers.

“Comfort Rwanda” is working to build a village of 100 homes for survivors of the genocide of 1994. This project brings together perpetrators of the genocide and survivors (mainly widows) of the families they killed, for spiritual and practical support. Comfort Rwanda provides funds to build low-cost houses (£1,000 each) for genocide survivors of these communities whose homes were destroyed and never rebuilt.
