## **DOING IT RIGHT**


#### Minister's Message

he great Scottish

philosopher David Hume in the eighteenth century identified the "isought problem" when studying the works of others. The problem, simply stated (I hope), is that we find ourselves all too easily slipping from statements about what we see around us (the "is" part) into prescriptive statements about what we should do (the "ought" part) and do so without any real evidence to back up how the "ought" statement follows from the "is" statement. This has been a nagging question for many an ethics scholar over the years We see this challenge at the time of writing as the nation ponders the "is" statements relating to our relationship with the European Union.

We read many stories from either side of the debate about what "is": the costs and benefits of membership of the EU, the feelings of antipathy towards Brussels rule, the historical background to the formation of the EU, the open borders, and so on.

And we hear a lot of statements about what we "ought" to do as a result. But as I have read these statements I have pondered the disconnect Hume identified. Does this action follow? Is what I am being asked to do really follow from the statements made?



# Urgent Instant Neighbour Appeal

t is a sad fact that many people in the UK find themselves relying on food banks. Aberdeen is no exception. Instant Neighbour provide emergency food parcels to individuals in desperate need of assistance.

They rely on donations of food to allow them to continue to provide this vital service and are incredibly grateful for all donations of non-perishable food items. In 2015 they provided 3,877 parcels to 1,237 different clients. Recently they have only been able to give those seeking help a very small amount of supplies such as soup or cereal due to a desperate shortage.

The shelves at Instant Neighbour are in need of constant replenishment and often the workers are unable to provide the assistance they would wish for those in need.

At Ferryhill Church we have a shopping trolley into which people can place their donations when they come to a Sunday service or when visiting the Coffee Shop any morning.

## **LCR** Is Go

As mentioned in the Spring issue of Parish News, our church will be involved in the process of Local Church Review (LCR) by Aberdeen Presbytery, something that every church experiences every five years. The purpose of review is for presbytery to encourage our mission in this parish, to help us set priorities and plans for the next five years.

This process is now underway, with two meetings already having taken place with the minister and some office bearers. A congregational meeting will be planned for early September so please watch out for this and have your input in the process.

## AV Project

At the time of writing we are halfway through the installation of a new audiovisual system within the church sanctuary. This will include a much more powerful projector than the one currently in use, a fixed intelligent glass screen, more flexible points for 'repeater' screens, cameras to record and computer systems to allow simulcast streaming of church services or events online—a boon for those unable to come to church regularly.

## Fairtrade In The Garden



Now that summer is (hopefully) here, many of you will be out in your gardens planting flowers, cutting grass, feeding birds and generally enjoying your lovely bit of creation. Traidcraft has many products to help make your garden even more beautiful.

# ATTRACTING WILDLIFE INTO YOUR GARDEN



#### **Bird Feeders**

A great way of attracting birds to your garden is by putting in a feeder. Put out a combination of nuts, seeds, and fat-balls using different types of feeders to draw in variety. Different species have their favourites, so include a range that means lots of birds can feed at once. Wood pigeons, for example, will feed off seeds on the ground which means the sparrows can have the hanging feeders to themselves.

Be strategic on where you put your feeder to keep the birds safe. Put them in the open so the birds can keep watch for predators, but also near trees or bushes to provide refuge. Don't forget to keep the food fresh and topped up and be patient.

Birds won't always notice food for several weeks but once they do and find it a consistently safe place to feed, they'll keep coming back! You can read tips on feeding British birds at https://www.rspb.org.uk/makeahomeforwildlife/advice/helpingbirds/feeding/.

#### **A Wild Patch**

s nature always messing up your garden? That's because it simply doesn't do tidy! From weeds in the flower beds to lichens on a tombstone, nature is always looking for a way to re-wild our work. One of the simplest ways of caring for creation is to let it do the work for you. This doesn't mean doing nothing but it might mean leaving that pile of rocks or letting the ivy grow by selectively letting a patch go wild.

This can be as simple as leaving a pile of logs or leaves in an unruly corner or letting the grass grow by experimenting with an out-of-sight location. RSPB Scotland advocate giving the mower a rest and letting insects and birds roam the grass!

You could even throw some wildflower seed down to grow attractive flowers in the patch you want to let slide.

#### Compost!

Compost is great because it provides food for some creatures, habitat for others and eventually, rich soil from which more life can grow. It might not be as exciting as birds and bats, but good soil is habitat to many little creatures!

Don't be afraid to throw your kitchen compostables into a compost bin and get your hands stirring it around. This is not only a sustainable, peatfree way of growing fruits and vegetables, but also a superb way to enrich poor soil by inviting worms and other wrigglers to work the soil for you. It also comes without packaging or air-miles!



We simply need our daily bread.


Enough and enough only. This day. This bread.
